1.0. BACKGROUND

In the last decade, Africa has been the center of new prospects in oil development hosting an influx of major oil companies and independents most of which have achieved very successful campaigns. In fact, as a result of the new prospects, particularly in the West Africa transformed margins and East Africa Regions, the continent has been described as the last oil frontier of the world. These developments have provided landmark opportunities for African government to transform their economies and deliver tangible development outcomes to the people.

However, experience in Africa and elsewhere have shown that there could be a link between oil wealth and under-development, poverty, environmental problems, and social and economic challenges. This phenomenon has been described as “oil curse”.

There is also abundant literature that suggests that oil wealth can be transformative if the structures for good governance are embedded in the political economy of oil development.

In spite of the governance challenges facing Africa's oil producers, most of the oil and gas summits or conference organized on the continent have been corporate platforms, often devoted to discussing business opportunities. These platforms do not involve

African citizens in the deliberations, thereby alienating their interests from policy formulation and governance processes. They are therefore excluded from promised benefits whilst being exposed to real impacts, which give way to extreme dissent, accounting for violent reactions in some countries.

A platform that brings relevant stakeholders and citizens together on annual basis to discuss and build consensus on key governance policies for the efficient and transparent management of Africa's oil wealth to positive development has become necessary.

The Summit called “The Africa Oil Governance Summit” will be held once every year focusing on relevant themes and countries.

The Summit each year will feature the launching of an “Africa Oil Governance Report” which will document and highlight progress made in oil governance on the continent.

An important feature of the Summit is the tripartite participation of Government, Oil Companies and Civil Society Organizations, which make the summit a true dialogue.



2.0. GHANA AS THE FOCUS OF THE FIRST 2015 SUMMIT

There will be a full session on Ghana's experience as a new oil producer. The theme of this session will be:

"FIVE YEARS OF OIL PRODUCTION IN GHANA – THE STATE OF OIL GOVERNANCE AND REFLECTIONS FOR AFRICAN OIL PRODUCERS"

Being one of the new frontiers to have moved from discovery to production in recent times, Ghana has been at the forefront of laying good governance structures for the management of her oil and gas resources. Since the commencement of oil production in 2010, Parliament has passed a number of landmark legislations:

- The Petroleum Revenue Management Act 2011 (Act 815)/Petroleum Revenue Management (Amendment) Act 2015.
- The Petroleum Commission Act 2011 (Act 821)
- The Petroleum (Local Content and Local Participation) Regulations (LI2204).

These legislations have extensive governance provisions that underscore Ghana's resolve to depart from the path of the "oil curse" and instead use her oil wealth to develop and transform the country for the benefit of her people.

The benefits of oil to the country have already been pronounced through employment and the government budget. Five years into oil and gas production, more than 130 million barrels of crude oil has been exported from the Jubilee Fields, making oil the second largest foreign exchange earner of the country after gold; about US\$3 billion has been received by the Government, and more than 7,000 Ghanaians have been reported to have been

employed by the oil and industry.

However, many believe that Ghana could have benefited more from oil if the government put in place other important governance structure and systems that promoted transparency and accountability in the oil and gas sector. This is based on the facts that oil contracts are not awarded through open and competitive bidding process, beneficial ownership information in oil deals remain state secrets; whilst contract disclosure remain the discretion of the Minister of Petroleum. There are also others who believe that Ghana's institutions are still weak and incapable of checking potential abuses by government functionaries and oil companies.

The most important justification for focusing the first Summit on Ghana is based on the fact that Ghana's oil sector will face important decisions late this year or early 2016 including but not limited to the following:

- i. Parliament will be debating and passing an important legislation – the new Petroleum (Exploration and Production) Bill, expected to repeal the current Petroleum (Exploration and Production) Law (PNDC Law 84).
- ii. Ghana's EITI process will go through another Validation in October.
- iii. Government will be issuing Regulations on Petroleum Revenue Management.
- iv. New Oil Contracts will be submitted to Parliament for approvals.

The need for broad consultations on the roadmap to effective oil governance in Ghana cannot be over-emphasized. However, the process must involve a national evaluation of the governance gains made so far, identification of weaknesses and gaps, and recommendations for up-scaling governance policies and structures to make Ghana a model for other African countries discovering or producing oil.

3.0. AFRICA RISING AS OIL CURSE BECKONS FOR MOST COUNTRIES

The Summit will also highlight the challenges confronting new frontier countries in Africa as they develop new policies, legislations and institutions. The best practices in oil and gas development can guide many African countries to adopt standards that protect the integrity of their institutions in managing oil and gas resources.

Following the oil price crash since last year, many doubt whether African governments have lost leverage to initiate and implement reforms as price risks increase. The implications of falling crude oil prices for good governance in the oil and gas sector therefore raise the more urgent questions on how to balance governance with investments by oil companies.

There are however oil companies that are still determined to increase corporate governance in spite of the price risks. It is believed that some oil companies are not averse to high governance standards in their operations because their actions and inactions could embolden African governments to initiate reforms or perpetuate rent seeking behaviour. Kosmos Energy for instance is listed on the New York Stock Exchange, which created platform for the

disclosure of its contracts and annual reporting on trading statistics such as crude oil price, unit cost of oil, crude oil volume and revenues from oil. Tullow Oil has also already commenced the implementation of the EU Transparency Law by publishing relevant data on oil production, oil price, and various payments to the government. But these are not adequate since these disclosures are made on international platforms.

ACEP is therefore organizing its first annual "Africa Oil Governance Summit" in Ghana, to provide platform for stock-taking on Africa's oil journey and to facilitate national and continental consensus building on key policies required to consolidate the continent's position as a shining example of good governance in resource management. The summit therefore offers the appropriate platform for stakeholders to conceptualize Africa's oil curse, and to dialogue on measures that address this canker. The EITI data according to international standards.

4.0. OBJECTIVES OF THE SUMMIT

There are three main objectives of the Summit. These are:

- i. To evaluate the progress made by Ghana and Africa in the area of oil governance;
- ii. To provide platform for national and continental consensus building on policies that must be adopted to deepen oil governance in Africa;
- iii. To identify best practices in oil governance for adoption by other African countries.

5.0. EXPECTED OUTCOMES

i. Consensus has been built on key governance policies for the development of the oil and gas sector;

ii. There is increased accountability to the people by Government and Oil companies that are involved in the development and management of the oil and gas resources;

iii. Citizens are better informed about the benefits and impacts the oil and gas industry and dialogue between Government, oil companies and citizens has been institutionalized.

6.0. THE 2015 SUMMIT

This year's Summit will be held in Accra, at the Labadi Beach Hotel Conference Hall on the 23rd November, 2015. November 2015 is significant because it marks exactly five years of oil production in Ghana from Jubilee.

The Theme of the Summit is "Africa Rising as Oil Curse beckons for most countries – Is good governance the missing link between oil wealth and development?"

The Summit will be divided into panels. Each Panel will feature three speakers carefully selected to reflect balance between government, industry, academia, Civil Society and international donor community. Also, an experienced professional will chair each Panel.

A comprehensive Summit Communiqué will be issued to the media at the end of the Summit; copies of which will be distributed to relevant Government Ministries, Agencies and Regulators.

1. Joyce Rosalind Aryee

Joyce Rosalind Aryee also known as 'Auntie Joyce, is a Ghanaian former politician, reverend minister and businessperson. Aryee is recognized for having served the Nation of Ghana for over 40 years in both the public and private sectors. She is the previous Chief Executive Officer of the Ghana Chamber of Mines and was the first woman in Africa to have held that role. She has also held political roles in Ghana from the early years of the PNDC government. She is currently the Executive Director of Salt and Light Ministries, a para-church organization. From 1982 to 1985 Aryee was Minister of Information for the PNDC.

During her early years, Aryee lived with her family in Suntreso, Kumasi where she started her early years of education at Methodist Primary School and Methodist Middle School. She later went to Achimota School and graduated from the University of Ghana, Legon with a BA (Hons) in English. From 1985 to 1987 she was Minister of Education, and in 1987-88 Minister of Local Government. From 1988 to 2001 she was Minister of Democracy in the Office of the Prime Minister, and from 1993 to 2001 a Member of the National Defence Council.

Aryee is currently the Founder and Executive Director of Salt & Light Ministries, a para-church organization. She also runs the Joyce Aryee CONSULT, which focusses in the areas of Management and Communications. She serves as a Board Member on several boards such as the Kinross Chirano Gold Mine Ghana board, the Mentoring Women Ghana board, and the Roman Ridge School Academic board. Aryee was given the Second Highest State Award, the Companion of the Order of the Volta in 2006 in recognition of her service to the nation. She is also the recipient of the Chartered Institute of Marketing, Ghana (CIMG), Marketing Woman of the Year Award for 2007 and

the African Leadership on Centre for Economic Development's African Female Business Leader of the Year Award for 2009.

Aryee is an Honorary Fellow of the Ghana Institution of Engineers and received an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Mines and Technology in recognition of her immense contributions to the growth of the mining industry. Ms Aryee has co-authored the book, 'The Transformed Mind with Samuel Koranteng-Pipim.

2. Nana Kobina Nketia V, Omanhene of Essikado Traditional Area

Nana Nketia V, was an active sportsman during his secondary school days at Mfantshipim School and competed in Javelin, Shot Put and Long Jump. He also played Cricket and a member of the Hockey team.

He once captained the school football team and was in 1971 honoured as Sportsman of the Year at Mfantshipim School. On the academic field, Nana Nketia, holds a degree in History from the University of Ghana and PhD in African History at the University of Calabar in Nigeria.

He chaired the Ghana Museums and Monuments Board, a member of the Ghana Broadcasting Corporation (GBC) and a former member of the Public Utilities Regulatory Commission (PURC). He is currently the Chairman of the Nana Kobina Nketia IV Trust, Robert Mitchell Foundation and serves on the Advisory Board of Care Ghana.

3. Maj. Daniel Sowa Ablorh-Quarcoo

Maj. Daniel Sowa Ablorh-Quarcoo is a former chairman of Public Interest Accountability Committee and a former Commissioner of Internal Revenue Services. Major serves on the Board of ICAG. He was born on July 29, 1951 at Adukrom Akuapem. After primary and middle school education at the Local Methodist School, he entered Prempeh College, Kumasi, for his secondary education in 1964 coming out in 1971 with his Ordinary and Advanced Level Certificates of the G.C.E. respectively.

He then continued to the Ghana Business School of the University of Ghana, Legon, and graduated with a B.Sc. (Admin.) Degree in Accounting. He enlisted in the Ghana Armed Forces as an Officer Cadet in April 1975 and was commissioned Lieutenant in November 1975.

He trained at the Royal Army Pay Corps (RAPC) Training School at Worthy Down, in the UK which eventually saw him successfully completing the examinations of the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants in November 1982 becoming a full member of the Institute in 1985. In 1989 he was also admitted to the Institute of Chartered Accountants (Ghana) as a member. After leaving the Armed Forces at the end of his short service commission in 1987, he joined the Ghana Cocoa Board as Management Accountant.

Major Ablorh-Quarcoo has had a rich experience in senior management having been head of the Finance Department of COCOBOD for nine years. He is very knowledgeable in International Finance as he was the designer and for many years the implementer of the famous COCOBOD Trade Finance Facility by which the Board financed its cocoa export business. Apart from being a Board Member at **UNIQUE TRUST FINANCIAL SERVICES LIMITED**, a leading non-bank financial institution in Ghana, he is also a Director of COCOA INPUTS

COMPANY LIMITED (C.I.C.) a farm inputs distribution company. He currently manages a small cocoa processing company ALLIED COCOA PRODUCTS LIMITED, Producers of high quality Broma natural cocoa powder.

- Maj. Ablorh-Quarcoo (Rtd.) has attended a few short courses to enhance his Post Qualification Education (PQE) these include: Strategic Management Course - School of Administration, University of Ghana (1997) International Trade Finance - Queen Anne's College, U.K. (1999) Intergrated Financial Management - St. Hugh's College, Oxford, U.K. He was for many years an examiner in Management Accounting for the Institute of Chartered Accountants (Ghana).

Other Key Competence

- He served for four (4) years on the Ghana Accounting Technicians (GATT) Committee of the Institute of Chartered Accountants (Ghana). This committee designed and introduced the Accounting Technicians Certificate Programme to help produce middle-level Accounting Professionals as obtains in other countries.
- He has worked as a Consultant on a few occasions for Michael Borish Inc., an International Management Consulting Firm
- He was a member of the team of specialists that handled the divestiture of Produce Buying Company Limited in 1999. It was the first SOE that was successfully divested by means of a share offer on the Ghana Stock Exchange rather than by direct sale or sealed bidding.

Major Ablorh-Quarcoo is married with five (5) children. A practicing Christian who is currently offering professional service, gratis, to the Methodist Church, Ghana, as the General Director, Board of Finance and Development.



4. Dr Juliette Twumasi-Anokye

Dr Juliette Twumasi-Anokye is a lawyer by profession and a regulatory specialist with over 20 years experience in public law, competition law, economic regulation, local content, contracts, consumer protection, and policy development in various sectors within the UK, Europe, and Ghana. She is currently Consultant, Local Content at the Petroleum Commission, Ghana and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Society for Petroleum Engineers. Prior to joining the Petroleum Commission, she was Senior Legal Counsel at the Ministry of Energy, Ghana. She has also worked in a number of senior positions in the regulatory sector in the United Kingdom, as an adjunct lecturer, and as a lawyer in private practice.

Juliette holds a PhD in competition law from King's College, London, an LLM from University College, London, a BL from Ghana School of Law, LLB from University of Ghana, Legon and a Postgraduate Certificate in Competition, Regulation and Economics from University of Nottingham.

5. Hon. (Dr). Albert Kan-Dapaah

Hon. (Dr). Albert Kan-Dapaah was born on 14 March 1953. He is an Ashanti and hails from Maase-Boaman in the Ashanti Region of Ghana. Albert Kan-Dapaah had his secondary education at Acherensua Secondary School from 1964 to 1969. He then studied Accountancy at the Institute of Professional Studies (IPS), Legon. He had further Accountancy courses at the North East London Polytechnic, London and the Emile Woolf College of Accountancy. Kan-Dapaah worked with Pannel Kerr Forster, a chartered accounting firm as an Audit Senior. He worked in their offices in Monrovia, Liberia and London, UK between 1978 and 1986. Back in Ghana, he was the

head of Audit at the Social Security and National Insurance Trust (SSNIT) from January 1987. In September 1987, he joined the Electricity Corporation of Ghana where he rose from Director of Audit to become Director for Finance, a position he held for six years.

Kan-Dapaah was a partner in Kwesie, Kan-Dapaah and Baah Co., a firm of Chartered Accountants in Accra. He was also managing Consultant of Kan-Dapaah and Associates, a utility consultancy support group. He has also lectured Auditing part-time at the School of Business Administration, University of Ghana and the IPS.

- Albert Kan-Dapaah was the Ashanti Regional Representative on the National Council of the New Patriotic Party (NPP) between 1992 and 1996. He was also a member of the Finance and Economic Affairs Committee of the NPP. He won the Afigya-Sekyere seat at the 1996 parliamentary election. He took his seat in January 1997 in opposition and has held his seat in the two subsequent parliamentary elections in 2000 and 2004. He became Minister for Energy in the Kufour government after the NPP won power in the 2000 elections. During the April 2003 cabinet reshuffle, he became the Minister for Communications and Technology. He became the Minister for Interior during Kufour's second term.

Hon. Kan-Dapaah is Executive Director of FAT-Africa and a Consulting Director of Centre for Public Accountability, University of Professional Studies, Accra.

Mohammed Amin. Adam PhD. before joining ACEP, Mohammed was the Coordinator of Ibis's extractives industries programme in Africa. He has also worked as the Oil Coordinator of Publish What You Pay Ghana. His experience in the public sector covered his work as an Energy Policy Analyst at the Ministry of Energy in Ghana, Commissioner of Ghana's Public Utilities and Regulatory Commission; and as a former Deputy Minister and Mayor of Ghana's third city of Tamale.

Mohammed holds a PhD from the University of Dundee specializing on fiscal policy options in resource rich economies and an Mphil (Economics)/B.A.(Hons) Economics from the University of Cape Coast.
